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# Northwest v. Ginsberg

- 2014 U.S. Supreme Court decision important to the airline industry and has implications for all transportation services
- Unanimous decision in Northwest v. Ginsberg held that individual states could not impose their own implied concepts of what constitutes "good faith and fair dealing" on deregulated airlines' contractual relations with their customers





### Caution

- Justice Alito's careful opinion, however, comes with a caution
- Court noted that airlines can and should address issues like those in their contracts of carriage, frequent flier rules and other binding documents
- Establishing choice of law rules is a good example;
   they can be very helpful in resolving disputes





### The Lesson?

- This raises a broader lesson for transportation services across the board
  - Deregulation is not the absence of rules, but rather the ability of operators to set their own rules on the basis of market considerations
  - And if they don't set their own rules, it may create a vacuum that regulators may not be reluctant to fill





## Currently...

- Trump Administration is cutting back on regulation
  - Sent out guidance to agencies intended to freeze new regulatory initiatives
  - Issued an Executive Order on Regulation and Controlling Regulatory Costs – the so-called "twofor-one" order – and has established Regulatory Reform officers in agencies





## Currently...

- These are welcome developments
- The government appeared to be in the process of turning back the clock on the deregulation of transportation services





#### **Bottom Line**

- Take initiative
  - Address these issues in your own rules, e.g., your schedules and tariffs
  - Consult with your trade associations on these issues, when appropriate
  - Courts will defer to, and enforce, the rules in your schedules, even absent actual knowledge of them, unless you have signed an actual contract covering the same services – and even in that case, your actual contracts can incorporate your schedules on matters not otherwise specifically addressed

Your relationships with your customers are too important to be left to uncertainty, regulatory intervention, or both.
