National Dredging Team

- The National Dredging Team (NDT) was established in 1995 to implement the recommendations in a <u>1994 Report</u> to the Secretary of Transportation on the dredging process, to promote national and regional consistency on dredging issues, and to provide a mechanism for issue resolution and information exchange among federal, state, and local agencies and stakeholders.
- It is the vision of the NDT that dredging of U.S. harbors and channels is conducted in a timely and cost-effective manner while meeting environmental protection, restoration, and enhancement goals.

National Dredging Policy

- A network of ports and harbors is essential to the U.S. economy.
- The nation's coastal, ocean, and freshwater resources are critical assets which must be protected.
- Consistent application of environmental statutes can protect the environment and allow for sustainable economic growth.
- Close coordination and planning at all levels of government are essential to economic growth and environmental protection.
- The regulatory process must be timely, efficient, and predictable.
- Dredged material management planning must be conducted in the context of the national transportation system, focused upon a regional basis, and use the watershed approach.
- Dredged material should be viewed as a resource.

Foundation for the NDT

- DOT Work Group:
 - Interagency group convened by MARAD.
- The Dredging Process in the US: An Action Plan for Improvement. 1994
 - National Dredging Policy.
 - 18 recommendations.

What is the National Dredging Team?

- Federal interagency group.
- Established 1995:
 - To promote national and regional consistency
 - To provide mechanism for conflict resolution and information exchange
 - To assist in implementing the National Dredging Policy
 - To facilitate operations of Regional Dredging Teams

What are the Regional Dredging Teams?

• Eleven RDTs.

- Composed of federal/state agencies and stakeholders.
- Intention to improve dredged material management by:
 - Fostering communication and planning.
 - Providing a forum for issue resolution.
 - Increasing public education and community involvement.

What is the NDT Action Agenda?



- 22 recommendations based on 2001 workshop.
- Developed by stakeholders from government, industry, environmental interests, contractors, academia, general public.

Issued in 2003

Dredged Material Management Action Agenda for the Next Decade

- General and specific recommendations across 4 themes:
 - Beneficial use of dredged material
 - Sediment management
 - Emerging issues
 - Strengthening the Regional Dredging Teams

NDT Action Agenda Review

- Finalized in 2003 the Action Agenda was to serve as a 10-year plan
- Mid-term review conducted in 2007
- Conclusion was the Action Agenda was on course with a few minor adjustments
- Action Item Addendum completed in 2008
